#### THIS WEEKS PROGRAM

**Lion Dr. Charles Verheyden** introduced **Dr. Raleigh White IV**, owner of the 400-acre White Ranch in Salado, who discussed White Tail Buck game management. Dr. White, who has managed his ranch for over 16 years, says there are three main components of successful game management programs: nutrition and habitat management; herd genetics; and age spectrum and herd management. Proper nutrition is vital to growing large bucks and especially for antler development. It takes a tremendous amount of nutrients to help a buck develop a large rack of horns much like it takes for human bone to develop and heal. Dr. White says that natural food sources are severely stressed during especially hot summers and hard winters. To combat this, he provides cultivated food plots, supplemental feedings, population control, and water. Deer are nocturnal herbivores; so daytime grazing is a sign of nutritional deficiency. Genetics of the herd is especially important in regards to antler development. Most ten point bucks were eight point bucks in their first year of antler growth. 85-95% of bucks taken in a season are typically in their first year of antlers. Selective harvesting and genetic enhancement through importation are two means to managing genetics. Habitat management involves restoring abused land, clearing mesquite and cedar, planting native grass and forbs (weeds), controlled burning, and segregating certain domestic stock like goats and sheep who compete for the same food source. One note: Ag land exemptions do extend to land used for wildlife management but such programs are highly regulated. Good program.
