Today, Angela McCleaf spoke to TFLC about the Temple Railroad & Heritage Museum. Ms.

McCleaf is the curator for the beautiful museum located in Santa Fe Plaza of downtown Temple. She has been at the museum for 6 years as of 10/1/2019! She told us how much she loves and appreciates trains! Ms. McCleaf told us the building where the museum



is housed now was completed in 1911, and has served as a railroad depot since that time. In the 1990s, the Santa Fe Railroad pulled out of the depot. The museum did not move in to the depot until 2000. Ms. McCleaf told us how much she appreciates the story of the city of Temple and its railroad history. She explained how the Santa Fe Hospital was started in Temple by the Santa Fe Railway to treat the numerous injuries that the railroad workforce would inevitably encounter. The hospital was



established in Temple since the only other option prior to that time was for workers to be transported all the way to Galveston for treatment at St.

Mary's Hospital. For serious injuries, a trip to Galveston would often prove too long for

workers to survive. The hospital would later become Scott & White Hospital, named after its first two chief surgeons, Arthur Carroll Scott and Raleigh R. White, Jr. Ms. McCleaf discussed the changing exhibits that the museum holds, and told us about the facilities available for rent to hold special events at the museum. Thank you Ms. McCleaf for your presentation!
