## THIS WEEKS PROGRAM

Lion Neil Graeff introduced Neil Coker, Temple College's Director of Simulation. Mr. Coker gave us a little history of TC's Simulation Center and a tour of the facility. Despite being fraught with one-liners, it was a very good, educational experience.

In Summer 2001, after a TC Bond Issue was approved, then-TC President Dr. Marc Nigliazzo made a proposal to Scott & White Administration to share the cost and use of a Simulation Center. In January 2004, the center was completed and is being utilized by all TC Health Professions programs; Scott & White Residents; Darnell Army Hospital residents; A&M medical students; Nursing Services at Kings Daughters, S&W, and the VA; and EMS Services in both Bell and Williamson counties.

The Simulation Center consists of a standardized outpatient clinic comprised of 10 exam rooms equipped with cameras and microphones. Patient actors are used train students on interview and interaction with patients. The most interesting part was the Inpatient area that included an ambulance bay, ER station, and 4 rooms that can be converted to ER and/or ICU units. Sim Man and Sim Baby are medium fidelity mannequins made by Laerdal in Gatesville (I know!), costing \$35K each. They can present a pulse, register ECG, tongue swelling, stiff neck, vocal cord spasm, and abnormal breathing patterns and symptoms. They can also accept a breathing tube, chest tube, IV, injections, and defibrillation. They are operated from a control room. Noel is an OB patient who can simulate several aspects of child birth.

Stan is a high fidelity (self contained) mannequin who can do everything Sim Man can but also display reaction to bar-coded pharmaceuticals and to oxygen/anesthetic gas mix. He exhibits pupil dilation and responds to a ventilator. He goes for about \$200,000 (funded by a grant). Excellent program!
