## What Happened at the Meeting



**Lion Debbie Stone** visited our club and spoke about the Texas Lions Camp in Kerrville TX.

In the beginning: During the mid 1940's a polio epidemic swept across the country, leaving thousands of Texas children disabled, the Lions of Texas decided there

was something that they could do to help. Responding to the very special needs of these children, the Lions of Texas formed the Texas Lions Camp to serve children with physical disabilities.

The idea for the Camp originated with Jack Roe and the Kerrville Lions Club. District 2-A Governor Jack Wiech encouraged the incoming eight district governors for 1948-49 to think of the camp as a statewide project and to promote it in their districts. These district governors later became the original incorporators and charter members of the Texas Lions League for Children, Inc., the organization which operates the Texas Lions Camp.



Today, over 1,500 children attend the Texas Lions Camp each summer. Through the years, more than 68,000 children with physical disabilities and Type 1 diabetes have discovered the delights of camp. They have experienced the exhilaration of learning to swim, and have developed the desire to improve themselves. Most importantly, they were afforded the opportunity to forget about their disabilities during the magic of camp.
